LONDON, May 5 (AP)—When the time comes for the Red Army to enter that part of Poland west of the old Curzon Line in pursuit of the Germans, the Russians have no intention of consulting the Polish Government in London about civil administration, any more than they have already in the eastern territory they claim as their own. Furthermore, the Russians will not only attempt to find leaders for the new government from liberated Poland, but they will resist any attempt by Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk to transplant his Cabinet of exiles, as presently constituted, from London to Polish soil.

exiled government, Prime Minister Churchill had told six underground leaders of Poland that Britain saw nothing unreasonable in the Russian demand for territory up to the Curzon Line.

Now it is well understood by Mr. Mikolajczyk that he cannot cede half his country to Russia without jeopardizing his Government's future in Poland. If he does not bow to Russia's demands, or at least enter into negotiations with Moscow on the basis of the Curzon Line, he face the Russian challenge of a new rival government springing from the ashes of what is left of old Poland without much hope of any real support from Washington or London.

There is one chance of his salvaging at least part of his present regime, which is composed chiefly of Socialists and peasants, but that involves jettisoning such supporters of his administration as

These are cold, hard facts in the Russo-Polish situation that propaganda and diplomacy tend to obfuscate and conceal. They are realities that such speeches as Labor Minister Ernest Bevin made yesterday at ceremonies marking the observance of the Polish national holiday only confuse without changing. For before Mr. Bevin delivered his address, re-
